CONFEDERATION LINE'S PIMISI STATION PAINTED PADDLE PROJECT



Are you an Algonquin community member interested in cultural art, crafts or history? Do you have experience in drawing, painting, crafting (beadwork, leather, etc.), or other hobbies (woodwork, iron work, etc.)?

We are looking for interested Algonquins to showcase their talent and creativity by painting paddles for an installation that will be featured at Confederation Line's Algonquin-themed Pimisi Station in Ottawa.



PUBLIC ART AT PIMISI STATION TO REFLECT AND CELEBRATE ALGONQUIN CULTURE

Since the early inception of the East-West Light Rail Transit project (now known as the Confederation Line), the City of Ottawa has embraced the opportunity to recognize and celebrate the art, culture and heritage of the Algonquin people.

As the Confederation Line's Algonquin-themed station, the design and art at Pimisi Station will celebrate the historical and contemporary culture of the Algonquin people. Algonquin artists and artisans have been invited through a phased approach to submit their qualifications to be considered for the design of contemporary, innovative Algonquin public artworks at Pimisi Station. Unique to Pimisi Station is the strong focus on consultation and collaboration with the Algonquin communities throughout the entire artistic process.

Phase 1 of the Confederation Line Art Program launched in July 2012 with Sobey Art Award winner Nadia Myre being selected as the Integrated Algonquin Artist at Pimisi Station. Nadia Myre is now nearing the completion of her Phase 1 designs for Pimisi Station, which were developed through close community engagement with the AOO and Algonquin communities, including participation in the annual Nation Gatherings and Talking Circles.

Phase 2 launched in June 2014, and internationally renowned Algonquin artist Simon Brascoupé was awarded the contract for the Non-Integrated Artwork at Pimisi Station.

One of the Phase 2 installations, titled The Algonquin Canoe Paddle, will occupy a place of prominence in the station's main hall. This installation will feature 100 paddles, each hand-painted by Algonquins and arranged in the shape of a canoe. The piece is inspired by the important Algonquin teaching that it takes many people to paddle a canoe.

To support the project, Simon will mentor four Algonquin artists – Emily Brascoupé-Hoefler, Doreen Stevens, Sherry-Ann Rodgers and Sylvia Tennisco – who will in turn conduct paddle-painting workshops throughout Algonquin Traditional Territory. We are seeking interested Algonquin community members of all ages – youth, adults and elders alike – to lend their talents to this exciting initiative.

The paddles painted in these workshops will be featured in temporary art exhibits throughout Algonquin Traditional Territory before final installation at Pimisi Station.

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Members of the Algonquins of Ontario – including youth, adults and elders – who have some experience in drawing, painting, crafting (beadwork, leather, etc.), or other hobbies (woodwork, iron work, etc.) are invited to participate in the Painted Paddle Project.

- One-day workshops will be held throughout the Algonquin Territory for participants to create paddles for the Algonquin Canoe Paddle installation at Pimisi Station.
- Professional Algonquin artists will be available at such workshops to help participants with their paddle designs and painting.
- All interested candidates must register for a workshop. Spaces are limited to 10-12 participants per workshop.
